Community Association

Community Preparedness Planning:

Roger Ball from the Nelson Emergency Management Office spoke about potential hazards to the Mapua community. Being relatively low lying, flooding could come from heavy rainfall run-off combined with high tides. Tsunami flooding could occur from earthquakes almost anywhere in the Pacific Ocean. Local earthquakes could cause extensive damage. Mr. Ball emphasised the importance of each family having an emergency supply of food & water to survive at least 3 days, and for the community to organise a local preparedness scheme. He provided emergency checklists to take away. Further preparedness planning will be discussed at the next regular meeting on December 10.

Old Mill Walk Seawall:

Bruno Lemke expressed his concern and frustration at the apparent TDC decision to forego any further extension of the seawall until next year and only then after another resource consent process. Those attending agreed that urgent action was needed without delay. Erosion of what remained of the walkway reserve escalated with each storm. A motion was passed requesting the TDC to move the seawall project forward at the quickest possible pace to complete that final segment.

Waterfront Park:

Final earthworks are underway, and the area will be turned over to the TDC hopefully early next year. Copies of the Council approved E2 plan of October 2002 were circulated,

and a Waterfront Park Working Group was formed consisting of Elena Ilalio, Hanne Bjorklund & Kathy Trott.

Strengthening Families - Mapua:

Helen Bibby reported on a very successful Strengthening Families event at the Mapua Domain on October 25th. At the event Celia Lashlie spoke separately to village youth and will provide feedback from this at a final meeting of the SF Group at Mapua School, 6:30pm December 6th. All are welcome to attend this meeting.

Village Domain:

Rebecca Patchett reported on the recent Community Domain meeting. A wide cross-section of the community attended and indicated a strong interest in the Domain and its various uses. The Mapua Hall Committee indicated they wish to be involved in planning initiatives and to establish liaison with the Domain Group. The suggestion for "bollard style" fencing along the roadway entrance to stop vehicles being driven onto the Domain met with a positive response. An executive working group was elected: Rebecca Patchett, Nadienne Cookson, Bridget Wild, George Ballentyne, Anna Caswell & Pam Stinton-Whetnall.

Community Association contd:

Highway 60 Kerbing:

Transit NZ has installed concrete kerbing from Warren Place to Ruby Bay to effectively delineate the roadway and footpath – a much needed safety measure finally in place.

Long Term Planning:

Devin Gallagher (Chair) and others met with TDC staff members in October to discuss TDC long term planning options for the Mapua area, covering a wide variety of future planning issues. Some present and future zonings have been deferred until adequate and appropriate infrastructure is in place, i.e. water, sewerage, storm water, roadways etc. They agreed to keep the community better informed of TDC planning decisions and issues, better communication being a key to better outcomes.

The Association will ask Planner Rose Biss and her staff to create and present a structure plan for the Mapua community at an open forum community meeting.

Aranui Trust Subdivision Resource Consent:

In view of the lack of time for members to consider the subdivision proposal prior to the deadline, the executive committee had made a submission subject to ratification, which was given.

Parking Outside 4-Square Shop:

Steve Elkington replied to a letter asking TDC to restrict parking on Aranui Road between the entry and exit to Mapua Store. He suggested parking be reduced to one from the existing two. The feeling of those present was for a combination of a motorcycle park and no-stopping lines. Cr. King suggested a letter of reply stating this and requesting TDC proceed with the consultation process proposed in Mr. Elkington's letter.

Good News for Mapua Hall

Some good news to report – we have just received a letter from the Canterbury Community Trust confirming a donation towards the replacement of the Hall chairs and tables. This money together with generous grants from the Tasman District Council, Mapua Business Association and a dollop from our own funds will go a long way to replacing the ageing chairs and tables.

Unfortunately due to pressure on the available funds that the Canterbury Community Trust had available in this round, we didn't quite get the total amount required to meet our "wish list". Now the Hall Committee will have to decide how best we can meet the need to comfortably seat the hall users from the amount we have to spend.

It has been suggested that some members of the community might want to donate a chair or table to the

Hall, if so we would be delighted to hear – please contact myself or any Committee member if you wish to do this. We will, of course, recognise any such donation in a suitable fashion.

We now await, with fingers crossed, the outcome of our application for a grant to carry out a Feasibility Study on how we might proceed with the future of the Hall as a hub for the activities of the local community.

STOP PRESS – we have just been advised that the application to the Lottery Community Facilities Fund for the above Feasibility Study has been successful. Now we have to get that under way – part of the process will involve the community to assess the local support for the outcomes recommended in the Study.

Congratulations to all those involved in the recent "Oklahoma" fair – well done.

Garden Notes

May I take this opportunity to wish all *Coastal News* readers the very best for the festive season.

This is the time when you can enjoy those new potatoes, green peas, thinnings of carrots, etc—the fruits of your labour. But your work is not quite done yet. December is the time to lift tulips and hyacinths before the tops are quite dead. They should not be exposed to the sun.

Daffodil bulbs that have ripened off can now be lifted, dried and cleaned, ready for replanting at the end of January. If left in the ground, all decayed foliage should be removed and holes left by such be filled with soil to minimise infestation by narcissus fly.

In the fruit garden, thinning of all trees should be done now so you will have larger fruit to pick later.In the vege patch, the sowing of beans can be done for two months yet. Celery, leeks, carrots still.

General: where water is in good supply the ground should have a good soaking when required, not a lot of light sprinkles which dry right away and do no good at all. A light hoeing can do as much good as a watering as this allows the air free entrance.

So until February, have a safe and a blessed time with family and friends.



Have a Green Christmas

Christmas has traditionally been a time to enjoy the company of family and friends and have some time out from our hectic working lives. In recent years though it has become a time of stress and financial strain for many and it certainly has become a time of waste with an ever-growing impact on the environment. Here a five simple things to consider to reduce the impact that your Christmas may be having on the environment:

1. Christmas cards

Every year tens of thousands of Christmas cards are given only to be thrown in the bin once the celebrations are over. Consider sending an e-Christmas card (there are plenty of good sites on the net) or just send a Christmas email. Update on Council Activities

It's been a busy month for Council staff working on Mapua Ruby Bay projects:

Engineering

A successful Open Day on the **Seaton Valley** stream upgrade project was held on Thursday 18 October. Council staff have taken feedback from the public at this meeting and are continuing to consult with affected landowners and other parties. A consent application is proposed to be lodged for these works in December. Physical works are likely to begin in the second quarter of 2008.

Stage 1 of the **Old Mill Walkway** Coastal Protection works is now complete. Staff are engaged in preliminary work required for obtaining resource consents for the next stage of work.

Tenders have now closed for the installation of approximately 3km of new water mains on Seaton Valley Rd, State Highway 60 and through private land. This project will provide security of supply to Mapua and its construction is expected to begin in February and conclude in May.

Environment & Planning

Staff met with Mapua & Districts Community Association in Richmond on 18 October. On 6 November policy staff attended a Mapua & Districts Business Association meeting to discuss future business needs in Mapua.

Several large subdivision applications in the Mapua village and in the Rural 3 Zone have been keeping Consents staff busy.

Work is proceeding on the future open space area south of the Mapua Wharf.

The Reserves Manager recently attended meetings with the McKee Memorial Recreation Reserve Management Committee and the Mapua Recreation Reserve Strategic planning Community Services group

Tis the Season to Keep Pets Safe

With Christmas fast approaching here are a few timely tips on keeping your pets safe and healthy over the holiday season:

Chocolate

Many people are unaware that chocolate is poisonous to dogs due the ingredient theobromine which they cannot break down. Baking chocolate and dark chocolate are particularly dangerous as they can contain 7-10 times as much theobromine as milk chocolate. The clinical signs of chocolate toxicity include hyperexicitability, nervousness, vomiting, diarrhoea and death. If your pet eats some chocolate then ring your vet immediately, if you know how much they have eaten we can calculate the likelihood of toxicity and institute treatment if necessary.

Poinsetta

Poinsetta plants are not toxic to animals but chewing on their leaves can be irritating to the mouth and stomach of the dog or cat that eats it.

Tinsels and ribbons

Cats and kittens often see these as toys to be played with, chewed and sometimes eaten. Once in the gastrointestinal tract they can act as a "linear foreign body" causing the intestine to bunch up around them leading to a blockage. This requires surgery to fix.

Beware of overfeeding

Lots of pets get extra treats over Christmas but please bear in mind that sudden rich diet changes can upset their gastrointestinal tract causing vomiting and diarrhoea. Fatty foods should be avoided as they can cause pancreatitis, which can be life-threatening.

Going fishing

Every summer we have the pleasure of extricating fish hooks from dog's stomachs, noses, ears, lips and tongues. Don't leave old bait on the end of hooks and make sure you



stash your fishing line out of reach of your dog.

Take care over Christmas and New Year and remember we are there if you need us. The clinic will be closed on the statutory holidays but a vet will be on duty 24 hours right through Christmas and New Year.


On the 4th of December, we will meet at the library at 11am to change our display for the last time before going on to Jesters for our Group Christmas lunch.

PROBUS CLUB OF MAPUA & DISTRICT

The club's monthly meeting was held on the 2nd of November at the Village Hall, with the main speaker being Sheila Budgen of the Spirit of Adventure Trust. Her subject was the involvement of teenagers sailing on the square-rigged sailing ship, The Spirit of New Zealand.

The Trust was set up in the early 1970s using the sailing ship Spirit of Adventure. Initially only boys applied for the 10-day training cruise. Since then an increasing number of girls have been applying for the cruise. By 1977 the Spirit of Adventure was sold to a tourist company in Fiji, and was replaced by the Spirit of New Zealand. It is operated by the Sail Training Association. Each training cruise the association employs five permanent crew, four watch leaders, and two cadets.

The Spirit of New Zealand runs 10-day training courses for 16 and 17-year-olds, and 5-day courses for the 13 to 15-year-olds. Apart from a month when the ship goes through an annual service programme, the training courses are operated throughout the year. The student trainees are recruited from New Zealand schools and come from a variety of backgrounds. Apart from learning sailing skills they have the experience of working as a team. In their 10-day trip the majority of students return home exited about various new experiences, new sights, and new friends. Sheila read out a negative report by a teenage girl on her initial experiences of the boat, such as cramped conditions, seasickness, and sleeping in three-tiered bunks. The same girl wrote a second report on the completion of her voyage. This was of her positive experiences, of learning new skills and seeing new areas of New Zealand she never would have seen.

The students have certain restrictions such as the use of cell phones, alcohol, and drugs. Smoking is discouraged. Reports back from some parents have said that they have found a positive improvement in their

children's attitude on completion of the trip, giving them more confidence and self-esteem.

Sheila finished her interesting talk with reference to the Spirit of Tasman Bay Trust, a fund-raising trust to help compensate part of the cost for students from our local district to sail on The Spirit of New Zealand

The club's mini speaker was a founding member, Peter Butchart. Peter gave an interesting 10-minute talk on his life experiences. He was brought up in Hawera and attended Hawera Technical College and later became a boarder at New Plymouth High School.

He did his Compulsory Military training with the RNZAF at Wigram airbase and became a member of the air flight crew. In 1957 he met his wife Margaret in Hawera. His first job was working in a bakehouse. From there it was dairy farming in the Pahiatua and Woodville area. The next business venture was running a 7-day a week dairy in Carterton. From there they moved to Riwaka in 1972, buying a tobacco farm, which they ran until 1980, when the government offered those in the industry the opportunity to sell their licenses. They moved on to growing kiwifruit. Margaret had the job of running the farm, while Peter took on a job working for Tallies Fisheries in the vegetable-processing shed. In 1986 they sold the farm and moved to their present home in Ruby Bay. By then Peter was involved in selling real estate up to 1996. He then bought a fluorescent light tube business, travelling around the district as far south as Kaikoura.

Peter's personal achievements include gaining a private pilot's license in 1976, and a commercial pilot's license in 1981. For many years Peter has organized travel groups for the 41 Club, often travelling with the group to a wide variety of countries.

On the 5th of November 12 club members enjoyed the "Operatunity" daytime concert. They were part of an audience of 652 people from local Probus clubs and retirement villages at the Annesbrook Church Hall. Five talented artists lead by Susan Boland put on a variety of songs including opera relevant to the concert title, "The Last Night of the Proms".

Property values in the Mapua Tasman area are in general holding up and are continuing to sell above their quotable value (GV) – although three Brabant Drive properties recently sold below their GV.

Overall the Tasman property market looks very sound – properties in excess of \$800,000 are taking longer to sell whilst the most active range is the \$300,000 to \$400,000 bracket.

Motoring with Mapua Auto

MTA Warns Motorists of Snow Tyre Dangers

The Motor Trade Association (MTA) is warning NZ motorists that snow tyres on vehicles in normal road conditions are dangerous, and should be replaced immediately with conventional road tyres.

The MTA warning follows its recent call to Government to ban imports of used snow tyres, and what appears to be a growing trend in motorists fitting them because their increased tread depth exceeds Warrant of Fitness (WOF) minimum levels.

MTA communications manager, Andy Cuming said the usual summer increase in vehicle movement made it particularly important for increased tyre and vehicle safety awareness. "We are sounding this alert in advance of the usual busy holiday period" he said.

MTA recommended Land Transport NZ (LTNZ) ban such tyres at used vehicle import entry, prohibit in used tyre imports and fail at vehicle WOF checks.

LTNZ is studying this in the wake of a number of fatal accidents where the use of snow tyres was cited as a major contributing factor. MTA is urging prompt action on the part of Government, and is also launching its own public awareness campaign. "There is no accurate figure on just how many vehicles would be affected, but our estimate would be some thousands" said Andy Cuming.

The MTA campaign urges motorists to check their tyres. If the word 'studless' or a snowflake symbol is on its side it is definitely a snow tyre. Otherwise tread patterns may look deceptively similar to conventional tyres – but there are very important differences in composition and flexibility. Those with snow tyres or unsure should contact an MTA member for advice.

Andy Cuming emphasised that at the present time snow tyres were legal, but motorists needed to understand that they are designed to operate in very cold conditions and are dangerous in normal NZ road conditions.

"Recent experiences with accidents on NZ roads, and analysis of the results of comprehensive tests, clearly indicate there is a serious problem with these tyres when used in conditions that are found quite normally on NZ roads" he said.

"The average motorist may not be aware they have these specialist tyres fitted, and certainly will not be aware of the unpredictable operating characteristics in certain conditions."

MTA will also encourage NZ Police to check vehicles for snow tyres in the normal course of their vehicle inspections and advise motorists if they are fitted.

Andy Cuming believed that inevitably it would be illegal to have snow tyres fitted to vehicles operating in normal road conditions, and that this would be policed through WOF checks and compliance checks on vehicle import entry.

"In the meantime there is a real need for motorists to be aware of the significant safety risks and seek advice," he said.

There are approximately 4,500 MTA member companies throughout NZ, with distinctive signage to identify their presence in every town.

Jenny Easton of the Tasman District Council uses the term "satisfactory" to describe the Mapua clean-up in her November 07 *Coastal News* article. Her lack of enthusiasm is underwhelming.

Again I have to challenge her statements regarding the Total Hazard Index (THI). It is a complicated, theoretical formula and regardless of the endless recent tweaking, is still quite inaccurate. It will not provide any assurance of health protection simply because they haven't included all the highly toxic chemicals that were in the air based on their own lab results. That ensures that the THI will always be favourably low. If the TDC or MFE can refute this claim or any other that has been made, then please do so.

Jenny's suggestion that high levels of toxic chemicals in the monitoring results were just a "nuisance" and possibly the result of tampering is appalling. Does she think the highly contaminated local snail population was also "tampered" with? Toxic chemicals are a health hazard, not a nuisance. The local residents who were exposed to the carcinogenic cocktail on almost a daily basis deserve a lot more credit than that.

After operating from the former Artizanne B&B in Higgs Rd for four years, I have now established my studio/gallery at 190 Dominion Rd., where the well known 'sawdust' sign is.

Continuing in the bold, colourful, 'blokey expressionist' manner, the current "Rooted in Tasman' series relates initially back to my mother's 'Roil' family arriving in Nelson on the Bolton in 1842. A feature of these larger paintings is their heavily textured surfaces. All the images are sourced locally and may be recognised. With at least six layers of meaning, there is plenty to reflect upon and talk about. Tree roots will never be the same! The first work in this series has been included in the 2008 Nelson Artists calendar.

Works from earlier series celebrating the local landscape, and the 'Fecundity' series which featured fertility through fruit, are available, some as prints.

In addition to paintings, there are various bronzes from twelve years of casting after being inspired by Jens Hansen's summer workshop in Nelson in 1981.

I welcome visits to view, discuss and perhaps purchase my works, by locals and visitors. Works may be trialled at home or business locally. Please make an appointment - to avoid disappointment.
